WHEREAS, in 2022, Governor DeSantis signed the No Patient Left Alone Act, protecting the rights of Florida families to visit loved ones receiving hospice care in health care facilities: and

WHEREAS, hospices in Florida recognize that our nation's veterans often have unique end-of-life needs and strive to celebrate the heroic work of our veterans, who have sacrificed much to guarantee our freedoms and quality of life; and

WHEREAS, in honor of hospice caregivers, volunteers, and staff, the month of November is nationally recognized as Hospice and Palliative Care Month.
